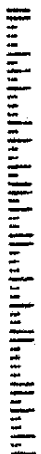
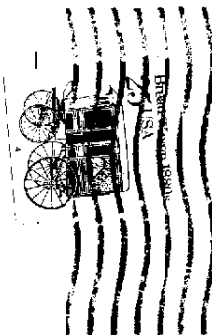

It has many good features and some faults. For the price and the system we have it is extremely versatile for just about every kind of word processing chores one would need. There are other word processors on the market and we hope to shed some light on these for the rest of the group. There is Word Writer, Writer Ease, Micro Word, and just recently released PRESS, which has the feature of WYSIWYG or 'What you see is what you get'. Word processing has come a long way since the advent of TI Writer. But it still one of the best. If you don't use it or have a printer, take heart! My son uses it for mass storage of his Baseball Card collection. A printer isn't mandatory for this type of use. But if you do use a printer give it a try. If you have children in school, printed homework is usually allowed and encouraged by some teachers. It shows the teacher that the student is developing in other areas as well as the host subject. Homework printed this way is a lot neater too. I use TI Writer to produce the 99er News, and produce a printed page of all pertinent data for my job. ----- What is it? -----

This month we will take a few steps back for the new users/members who recently joined the club. This will be a discussion of disk drives. First the obvious question - What is it? Well.....a disk drive is data storage device. An electronic file cabinet so to speak. If you have been using a cassette system to store your programs or data, you will be amazed at the speed that a disk drive saves and loads programs and data. If your program took 2 minutes to load from cassette, then it will usually take less than 30 seconds with a disk system. Remember that this time doesn't include the time needed to 'RUN' and for the computer to set all the variables, arrays and tables, we still have to contend with that, but still the improvement is nothing short of FANTASTIC. Now for the second question - Just how much of the system do I need to use a disk drive? This is a question with MANY answers. The first will be the use of a Stand Alone Controller. The computer cannot access a disk drive without one. It is a device that handles the data produced by the computer and directs it to the disk drive for storage. A Stand Alone Controller simply connects to the right side of the console via the I/O port. The second system is the Peripheral Expansion System. This

system is a box that will allow you use a Disk Controller Card. The system also has 8 slots for various other cards to be discussed in a later article. It performs basically the same as the stand alone system but it allows one use of Double Sided Drives (discussed later in this article). Finally there is the aftermarket controllers. These are made by Myarc and CorComp. They have a few more features than the TI offers such as Double density. They can be had as a card or Stand Alone also. This covers the controller portion of this article. We now venture into the realm of Disk Drives. Again there is a multitude of drives available that will work with a TI computer. There actually too many to list here. I will try to explain what I am familiar with. My first system came with a Shugart 5 1/4 model 400L drive. It is what is called a SSDD (single sided single density). It is the least configuration for a system (the most basic). A word of note: Just about every Fairware and Commercial piece of software will require only this basic of a system, but read the documentation first before you buy if possible! The next step for one could be the addition of a second disk drive to your system. This can be done several ways. You can purchase a drive 'bare' or with a power supply. I have noticed that the surplus Tandy (Radio Shack) drive power supply with case are excellent for this purpose. The price usually \$25 to \$75 depending on where you shop. When adding the second drive I recommend that you have someone help with the connection and setup. It isn't complicated but it is frustrating to the novice. One suggestion is come to the meeting with your drives and ALL cables needed to connect it and pay the extra fee for the extra hour and we will help you as much as we can. More on the drives now.....SSDD (360 sectors in single density or 90K), SSDD (720 sectors in double density or 180K), DSSD (720 sectors in single density or 180K), and DSDD (1440 sectors in double density or 1440 sectors), sound confusing? It can be to the new user. These are the various 'configurations' that will be described for use with the Texas Instruments system. Keep in mind that to fully use your system, you don't NEED the most sector storage available or the most drives your controller can handle. Most systems now are setup with 2 drives and they are perking along happily with little problems for their owners. The double sided and double density options are simply the luxuries that most of us can't afford. Kinda like having electric windows versus hand cranks on our cars. You can pay for it but it can still be done less expensively. So here it is folks, I hope I answered a few questions for you and please don't hesitate to ask at the meetings. - TLC
