A PROGRAMMING TIP

If you like to write your own game programs, as I do, you may have noticed that the random number generator in the 99/4A is not very fast.

I have found a way of speeding up the process that in most cases will give suitable "random" numbers almost twice as fast.

By generating only one random number at the beginning of the program and performing a few simple mathematic functions on it, I am able to keep using the number over and over to generate "random" numbers throughout my programs.

Here is a sample program:

```
10 Z=RND :: INPUT X
20 Y=INT(Z*X)+1 :: PRINT Y;
30 Z=Z*X+1-Y :: GOTO 20
```

This program will generate random numbers between 1 and X.

There are some minor limitations to the usefulness of this process:

1. The value of X cannot be a multiple of 10
2. The gain in speed only seems to work in Extended Basic

Here is another program that will let you time and compare between this process and just using "RND" function:

Prints 100 random numbers between 1 and 9 using two methods.
